Coeliac Disease:

The aim of this session is to provide a pragmatic overview of the management of a patient with either suspected or proven coeliac disease.

- The oral manifestations of coeliac disease
 - The association between oral ulceration and coeliac disease
- The associations between coeliac disease and other diseases
- The risks associated with long-term, untreated coeliac disease
- Screening for, and making a diagnosis of coeliac disease
- The practicalities of eating a gluten-free diet

Crohn's Disease:

The aim of this session is to provide a pragmatic overview of the management of a patient with either suspected or proven Crohn's disease.

By the end of the session you should have an understanding of:

- The epidemiology and prevalence of Crohn's disease
- The typical presentation of Crohn's disease
- The oral manifestations of Crohn's disease
 - Controversies surrounding the relationship between oral Crohn's disease and Orofacial Granulomatosis (OFG)
- The extra-gastrointestinal tract manifestations and associations of Crohn's disease
- The investigation of someone with suspected Crohn's disease
- The mainstream medical management of Crohn's disease, second-line therapies and the emergence of new therapeutic approaches
